

## The Elder Justice Roadmap Definition of Elder Abuse

#### Elder abuse is:

- physical, sexual, or psychological abuse, as well as neglect, abandonment, and financial exploitation of an older person by another person or entity,
- that occurs in any setting (e.g., home, community, or facility),
- either in a relationship where there is an expectation of trust and/or when an older person is targeted based on age or disability.







#### Stalking is DANGEROUS

- Stalking often co-occurs with physical assault and sexual violence, including rape.
- 20% of stalkers use **weapons** to threaten or harm victims.
- 76% of intimate partner femicides included stalking in the year prior.

- 298 involve stalking (1 in 6)

#### **Behavioral Definition**

#### Stalking:

A pattern of behavior directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to feel fear.

#### A Pattern of Behavior...

- Not a single incident or "one off" event.
- Called a "course of conduct" in most stalking statutes.







#### **Multiple Behaviors**

- 78% of stalkers use more than one means of approach.
- 66% of stalkers pursue their victim at least once per week.
- 20% of stalkers use weapons to threaten or harm victims.





#### Study of Women with **Protective Orders**

Women who were abused and stalked experienced significantly higher rates of the following than women who were abused but not stalked:

- · Verbal abuse, degradation, jealousy and control
- · Serious threats
- Moderate and severe physical violence
- Sexual violence and sexual assault
- · Threats to kill and threats with a weapon
- · Being beat up, attacks with a weapon and injury

#### Intersections of Sexual Violence and Stalking

A stalker may:

- · Threaten to sexually assault the victim
- · Sexually assault the victim.
- · Attempt to get someone else to sexually assault the victim.

#### How Offenders Groom for Sexual Violence

- 1. Research and identify vulnerable victims
- 2. Establish relationships: contact, build trust
- 3. Meet in-person and isolate the victim
- 4. Coerce into sexual act(s)
- 5. Contact after

## Warning Signs: Stalkers' Use of Technology

- · Knows where victim is
- Has access to information that victim never shared with him/her
- Victim is locked out of accounts, passwords changed, etc.

Reaction to Older Stalking Victims


77% of older victims were told they were overreacting


