## The Elder Justice Roadmap Definition of Elder Abuse

### Elder abuse is:

- physical, sexual, or psychological abuse, as well as neglect, abandonment, and financial exploitation of an older person by another person or entity,
- □ that occurs in any setting (e.g., home, community, or facility),
- either in a relationship where there is an expectation of trust and/or when an older person is targeted based on age or disability.

Women are more likely than men to experience stalking.


















## Multiple Behaviors □ 78% of stalkers use more than one means of approach. □ 66% of stalkers pursue their victim at least once per week. □ 20% of stalkers use weapons to threaten or harm victims. ## Intersections of Sexual Violence and Stalking

### A stalker may:

- $\hfill\Box$  Threaten to sexually assault the victim
- □ Sexually assault the victim.
- $\hfill\Box$  Attempt to get someone else to sexually assault the victim.

## Grooming for SA as Stalking



- □ 6% of the 1882 college men surveyed met the criteria for attempted or completed rape.
- □ These were repeat perpetrators who averaged about 6 rapes per person.

## Grooming for SA as Stalking

(Continued)

Repeat sexual assault perpetrators on campus often premeditated the rape:

- □ Chose targets intentionally.
  Identified vulnerable young
  women, often focusing on
  Freshmen
- Contacted multiple times: invited them to parties, messaged through social media, texting and call.
- Plied with alcohol: served drinks, controlled alcohol, made strong drinks
- Isolated victims: many had rooms set up at their parties for the purpose of committing rape
- Contacted after: texted, messaged and/or called to either threaten and/or invite to another party

## **Technology Use Among Seniors**



- □ 80% own cell phones, 40% own smartphones
- □ 67% of adults ages 65 use the internet
- □ 34% use social media
- Younger seniors (65-69) have significantly higher rates of technology use than older seniors

## Warning Signs: Stalkers' Use of Technology


- □ Knows where victim is
- $\hfill\Box$  Has access to information that victim never shared with him/her
- □ Victim is locked out of accounts, passwords changed, etc.

## Older Stalkers (Aged 60+)

- □ Least likely to target same-sex victims (10%)
- □ Most likely to actually injure victims
- ☐ More likely to target victims outside of their own age group, like younger acquaintances



## **Reporting Rates**


- □ Less than half of stalking victims report to the police.
- □ Why might elderly victims be hesitant to report? What barriers might they face?




## Reaction to Older Stalking Victims 77% of older victims were told they are overreacting 66.7% of older victims were not taken seriously by the police Stalking and Age, Sheridan et al. (2015) NCALL and SPARC

## **Implications**


- □ Are we recognizing stalking in older adults?


